the basics


In early 2015, under the leadership and direction of Dave Cortese, President of the why Board of Supervisors, the Neighborhood Safety Unit (NSU) was formed in an effort to implement a place-based, violence prevention program to serve neighborhoods with the highest juvenile crime rates in the county.

With a broad coalition of county and city government agencies, including law enforcement, human services agencies, child-welfare, public health, behavioral health and others, along side non-profit and advocacy organizations, the NSU uses a public health lens to implement violence prevention strategies. Two neighborhoods were selected to be served by the NSU, one of which, the Valley Palms neighborhood, lies within the 95122 Zip Code.



Area of Focus: Total Square Miles: .93

In 2015, 95122 had more youth arrests than any other county zip code, with 260.




Reasons for Arrests in 95122


A key partner in the this effort is Project Access, a place-based, non-profit agency already providing on-site programming to youth and families living in the complex. In 2015 alone, Project Access, Inc. has served over 13,000 residents, operating over 47 family resource centers and 16 senior centers nation-wide.

With the foundational work of building trust with residents already in tact, the infusion of additional resources into the neighborhood allowed for a more intentional focus on helping residents organize a coalition to combat violence in their neighborhood.

why this matters

- Valley Palms Apartment Complex is a 354-unit housing complex located in the 95122 zip code of East San Jose. It is one of the more affordable housing complexes located in East San Jose.
- An estimated 3,000+ residents live at Valley Palms.
- Majority Latino, with 80% of adults reporting Spanish as their primary language.
- Families served by Project Access have annual households at or below 60% of the area median income level, and a substantial number are earning less than \$10,000 per year.
- The Mayor's Gang Prevention Task Force has identified the complex itself as a hot-spot for gang-related crime and activity.

alex's story

At the age of 18, Alex, a lifetime resident of the Valley Palms Apartment Complex, began supporting his family by working at a local McDonald's when his mom was diagnosed with cancer and could no longer work. While still in high school, he excelled in both academics and sports, and received a full scholarship to UC Merced. In order to care for his mother and stay close to home, Alex turned down the opportunity to attend UC Merced and is now attending Evergreen Community College. He still supports his family by working at Denny's, and is continuing to pursue his goal of becoming a mechanical engineer.

"Three weeks before my graduation my mom became very sick. She stayed in the hospital for two months because she could not breathe on her own and her muscles and bones were weaker than ever. My responsibilities arew immensely: I went school, to track practice, to work and after getting out work-often around one in the morning—I drove to the hospital to stay with my mom. Those three weeks were the most stressful ones in my life. My mom couldn't attend my graduation ceremony but I graduated and went to the hospital right after in my gown. Her smile filled my body with joy because it was her sacrifices that brought me to this point. The following two months were full of tests where three cancerous tumors were found: in her head, in her ovaries, and in her chest. Each one has to be removed through various surgeries, the first of which is in December. With this, my family and I made the decision to deny UC Merced's full scholarship offer so I could stay close and care for my mom. I'm currently attending Evergreen Community College and with the support of Project Access, I hope to transfer to San Jose State's Engineering Program by Spring semester."

Despite facing immense challenges, Alex continues to volunteer and mentor other young teens in the community, and is spearheading the Valley Palms Neighborhood Association's Youth Council at the Project Access Family Resource Center. Alex is indeed a leader in his neighborhood and a strong role model for the other youth in the program who are pursuing pathways out of poverty despite facing significant challenges.

project overview

how it works



Through a collaborative community process and under the leadership of the Valley Palms Neighborhood Association, community members (including both youth and adults) identified neighborhood cohesion, resident safety and wellbeing as their three highest priorities to achieve by 2017.

The NSU is currently in the process of identifying key partners in developing a funding strategy and partnership plan to move this project forward.

who To achieve neighborhood cohesion and wellbeing, the residents of the Valley Palms Apartment Complex decided they would like to convert an existing tennis court located within the Valley Palms Apartment Complex into an artificial turf soccer field.

A broad coalition of government and private sector busi-

nesses will be needed, in partnership with community members, to build a safe place to play for the Valley Palms residents.

- when The total estimated project timeline is10-13 months. The first 3-4 months will focus on fundraising, and the following 7-10 months will focus on planning, permitting, and construction. Partnerships will be leveraged to activate the space on an ongoing basis.
- estimate The total estimate cost to construct and activate the artificial turf soccer field at the Valley Palms Apartment Complex is approximately \$175K \$377K.
