Building Bridges, Multi-Generational Leadership in the Valley Palms Neighborhood by Aundraya Martinez

As one of the most active families in the Valley Palms community in East San Jose both in the onsite Family Resource Center and as leaders in the Valley Palms Neighborhood Association, the Gonzalez-Alvarado Family embodies what it means to echale ganas. The matriarch of the family, Maria Gonzalez, wife and mother of four (Rosa 18 years old, Daniel 12 years old, Angel 9 years old, and Alejandro 3 years old) works in a local restaurant, serves as the Vice

President of the Valley Palms Neighborhood Association, and volunteers regularly at the Project Access Family Resource Center and Katherine Smith Elementary School.

In their founding year, Maria and the VPNA have already celebrated

many accomplishments including: securing additional funding for the VPNA events, establishing a leadership committee and growing general membership, and developing neighborhood action goals with their peers. As the Vice President, Maria is an integral part of the successes the VPNA has achieved – since the very first cafecito in May of 2015, Maria has spent every Friday evening giving back to her community by

Rosa Alvarado, Maria's eldest child, is the first in her family to graduate from high school and will be attending San Jose State University in the Fall to pursue a degree in Sociology. Inspired by her own mom and the moms of the neighborhood who met weekly to talk about what would make them feel safer in their community, Rosa joined the group that later became the Valley Palms

Youth Council with six of her peers. As a junior in high school at the time, Rosa was a mentor to the younger youth leaders but was also mentored by her older peers, two of which were already in college. Recognizing their experi-

advocating for a healthier, safer, more connected environment for the children of Valley Palms to grow up in. Her natural leadership and willingness to build stronger relationships with her neighbors, her dedication to attending countless meetings and making regular phone call reminders, and her courage in being in the forefront of the meetings, visits with local civic leaders, and campaigns have inspired not only her neighbors but her family



ence as both students and teachers, Rosa and the Valley Palms Youth Council decided to center their goals around access to resources on more effectively navigating the path to higher educa-

tion, especially as firstgeneration students of color.

Palms Neighborhood Association, volunteers at various
Family Resource Center
events, and participates in
leadership development workshops hosted by Somos May-

fair. Rosa's participation and leadership on the Youth Council has ensured stability and vision as the Youth Council continues to build its foundation and grow membership. Their goal of creating a twotiered mentorship program where VP college students mentor high school students and high school students mentor middle school students is a testament to the type of leaders that grow up in this community - leaders that are committed to building bridges for the next generation of students. Together, Maria and Rosa have contributed countless hours to their neighborhood, strengthening relationships with those around them and thereby ensuring a stronger, more united, and safer Valley Palms.
